NARRATIVE WITH MAPS

TRAINING AND PREPARATION FOR COMBAT:

For twenty-two (22) months prior to commitment to combat of the first elements of the 92d Infantry Division on 24 August 1944, all efforts were directed towards creating, through realistic and imaginative training, a physically toughened, efficient battle force thoroughly skilled and imbued with the desire to close with and destroy any enemy engaged. Thus, the division training program since activation on 15 October 1942 followed the War Department's and Army Ground Force's prescribed programs. In addition, the Division Commander directed reviews additional combat exercises and special training such as mountain operations, stream crossings, patrolling and combined exercises involving tanks and tank destroyers. Unit schools within battalions, regiments and under Division supervision were held and special schools were conducted to combat the problem of illiteracy of some 2,200 men.

Frequent and detailed command and staff inspections during this early and formative period repeatedly indicated that the 92d Division Soldier was getting his share of the best leadership and equipment that the country could produce. Tests and inspections showed deficiencies which resulted in an increase of four (4) weeks in the MTP period; the extension of the Unit and combined Training Periods from twenty (20) to twenty eight (28) weeks; the retesting of nine (9) of the eighteen (18) Infantry Battalion Combat Firing Tests and the retesting of two (2) Artillery battalions in the AGF Field Artillery Battalion Firing Tests.

From the standpoint of training aids and facilities, the conditions under which the 92d Infantry Division trained left little to be desired. All but five (5) months of the training was accomplished at Fort Huachuca, Arizona, which is an excellent training area. Its climate eliminated the "rainy-day schedule" so common to other military posts. The varied terrain there included semi-desert and mountains that compared with sections of the Appenines of Italy; it lent itself well to close-in training and broad tactical problems. Later, in Army Ground Forces Maneuvers, the wooded terrain of Louisiana provided an adequate contrast.

When the Division first echelon, Combat Team 370, left Fort Huachuca, on 26 June 1944, and when the remainder followed shortly thereafter, they all carried with them the best in modern equipment, a full compliment of trained officers and men, and the War Department's stamp of approval.

OPERATIONS:

Enemy forces that opposed the 92d Division remained relatively unchanged throughout the operations, except in April when the enemy was reinforced by two (2) first rate battalions of Infantry and about 2,000 miscellaneous troops. Also there were some changes in dispositions and local reliefs. The 42 Jaeger Division had been relieved on 24 October 1944 by the

148th Infantry Division. Thereafter the enemy units were always under the command of General FRETTER-PICO, Commanding General, 148th Infantry Division, who controlled a sector that was roughly equivalent to that of the 92d Division. General PICO's command consisted of both German and Italian units. The Italians, who represented the ITALIA, MONTE ROSA, and SAN MARCO Divisions, occupied relatively inaccessible portions of the line, but there were always German troops available as a stabilizing influence or ready to fill any breach in the defenses.

These German troops themselves were by far not the most reliable in ITALY. Prisoners of War occasionally referred to the 148th Infantry Division as the Polish Division. There were a large number of desertions, both German and Italian, thus accounting for the fact that during the period 5 October 1944 to 5 April 1945 the Division processed 3,331 prisoners of war.

Between 24 August and 5 October 1944 the combat history of the 92d Infantry Division in Italy is centered around the activities of Combat Team 370, commanded by Colonel RAYMOND G. SHERMAN. This advance element was attached to the 1st Armored Division (US) under IV Corps, and participated in activities in connection with the seizing and crossing of the ARNO River, the occupation of LUCCA, and the development of the GOTHIC LINE. Enemy resistance had been almost negligible; battle indoctrination was gradual and progressive; and although the pitfalls common to all new units were experienced, the operational results were good.

Task Force 92 was activated on the LIGURIAN COASTAL FLANK of the Fifth Army on 5 October 1944. The Task Force was composed of the 2d Armored Group, a white antiaircraft unit acting as Infantry and the presumably "battle-wise" 370th Infantry. On the morning of 6 October this new combination, under the command of Major General E. M. AIMOND, attacked to the northwest towards MASSA to seize that city as its objective. The mission was not accomplished after 6 days.

The next distinct military operation occurred in the SERCHIO RIVER VALLEY (Map #2). Advances of up to three (3) and four (4) miles were made against light enemy resistance between 6 and 19 November by the 370th Infantry when it had attacked over difficult terrain with the objective to seize CASTELNUOVO in the then unfamiliar SERCHIO VALLEY SECTOR. Platoon and company attacks and strong patrolling by the 371st Infantry and 365th Infantry were made against the more strongly held coastal line south of MASSA (Map #2).

On 4 December the 365th Combat Team was relieved from the 92d Division and was attached to the 88th Infantry Division, where it was assigned a quiet sector south of BOLOGNA near SAVAZZA. The 366th Infantry, a separate Negro regiment that had just completed eight (8) months of service guarding airbase activities in southern Italy was attached to and joined the 92d Infantry Division on 28 November 1944. In the meantime, the 370th and 371st Regiments carried on routine reliefs, patrolling, and nightly infantry weapons shoots.

Late in December, reliable information indicated that the enemy was contemplating a Christmas attack in the SERCHIO SECTOR (Map #3). The Division assumed a defensive role but when the enemy attacked, positions were penetrated so that the 2d Battalion, 366th Infantry and later the 1st Bn, 370th Infantry were forced to withdraw. Then, on 27 December, the 8th Indian Division assumed control of the SERCHIO SECTOR: and two (2) Regiments from other U. S. divisions (from the 85th Division, the 337th and from the 34th Division, the 135th Infantry Regiments) and the 760th Med Tank Bn were attached to the 92d Division and held in readiness as reserves (Maps #3 and #4). As the enemy threat disappeared, the 8th Indian Division and the attached units were released. On 10 January 1945 the Division again assumed control in the SERCHIO. The 365th Infantry returned and was assigned positions east of the SERCHIO RIVER, formerly held by the 370th Infantry plus one (1) battalion, 366th Infantry. (Map #4)

On 17 January the 366th Infantry, minus the 3d Battalion, assumed command on the west bank of the SERCHIO RIVER. The 370th Infantry began a rehabilitation program in the Division Training area. Then, early in February, local offensive operations were again initiated; the 365th and the newly added 366th Infantry Regiments advanced against enemy opposition in the organized defensive position in the SERCHIO SECTOR. Local gains were made; part of LAMA DI SOTO RIDGE was taken; and the GALLICANO-VERGEMOLI ROAD was secured.

A reorganization of the Infantry elements of the Division was initiated on 24 February when steps were taken to concentrate in the 370th Infantry Regiment the best qualified infantry officers, noncommissioned officers and enlisted men that could be selected from the three (3) infantry regiments of the Division. Emphasis was placed on the utilization of the individuals who had in some way demonstrated apparent reliability in combat operations. Battalion commanders, staffs, company commanders, platoon leaders and noncommissioned officers were all selected with an eye to providing the best leadership and guidance that could be obtained. Then the other enlisted personnel were carefully selected, each man being picked from the three (3) regiments as the best man available. This reorganization was completed on 17 March and involved approximately eighty (80) officers in addition to 1,800 men. An intensive training and rehabilitation program was initiated in an excellent training area.

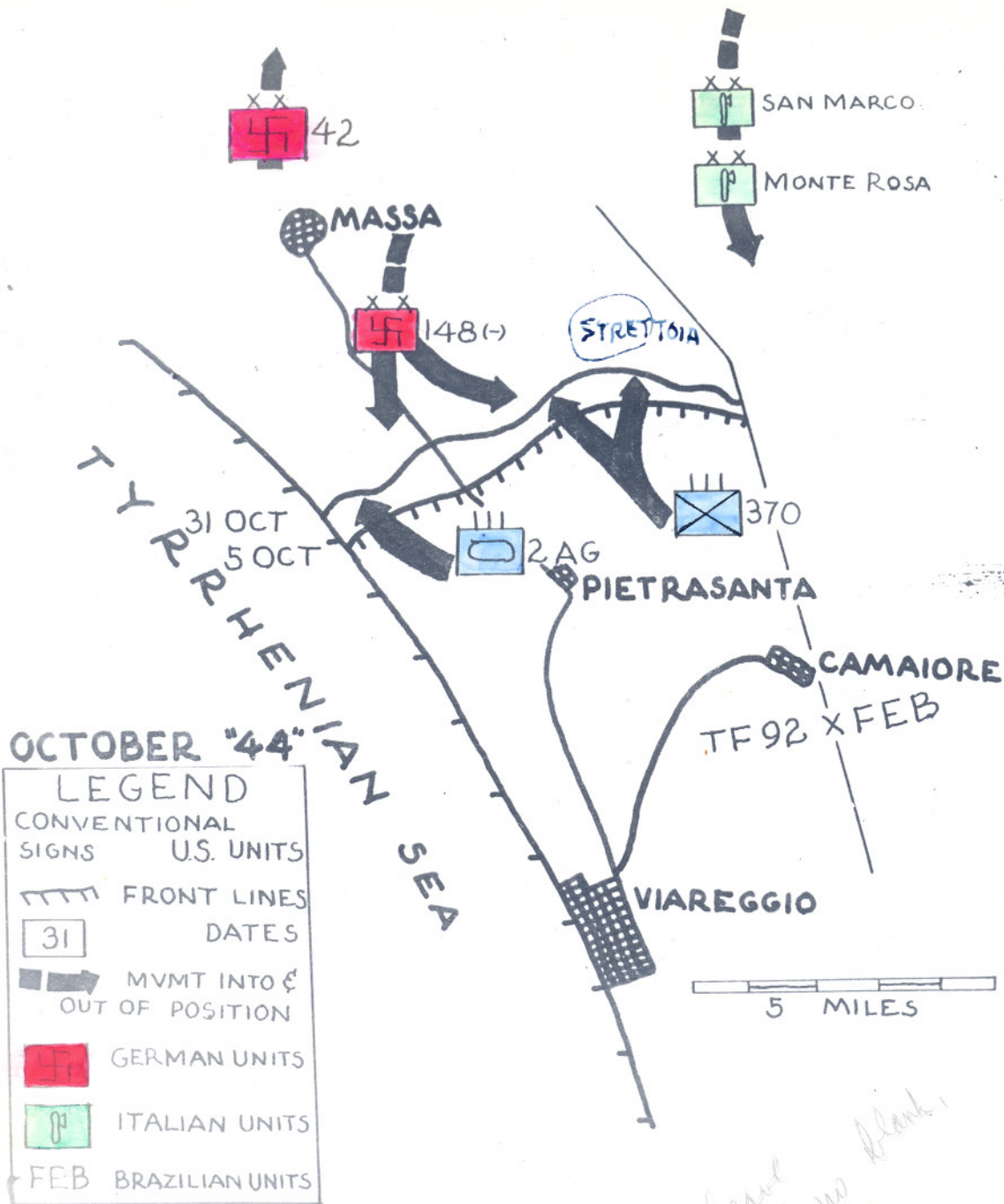
In preparation for the spring offensive in ITALY, Fifth Army extended the Division sector to the 44 Easting on the 23 February and thus, the 473d Infantry Regiment, a white unit recently formed from antiaircraft artillery and armored personnel was introduced. This regiment moved to relieve the 366th Infantry, and assumed command in the SERCHIO SECTOR on 26th February. The 366th Infantry began a rehabilitation and training program that lasted until 29 March when the regiment left the Division and was reorganized as engineer service troops. The 365th Infantry left the 92d Division's sector (map #5) again on 28 February to assume command in the quiet CUTIGLIANO SECTOR under IV Corps. Rotation, local reliefs, patrolling and training highlighted the Division's activities during the month of March.

A major step in the reorganization program for the 92d Division was the introduction of the 442d Infantry Regiment, an already famous Japanese-American unit. The reorganized and "battle-experienced" 370th Infantry Regiment was thus the only organic infantry unit left of the original three (3) Infantry Regiments of the Division. According to operational plans the 371st Infantry was to be withdrawn from the Division within three (3) days after the attack began, and was to be given a quiet sector by IV Corps. 365th Infantry was already detached and in the CUTIGLIANO SECTOR (IV Corps).

Thus, the 92d Division operations after 25 March were actually executed by a three-regiment task force, commanded by Major General E. M. Almond, planned by the original 92d Division Staff and supported by the original Artillery and service troops of the 92d Infantry Division.

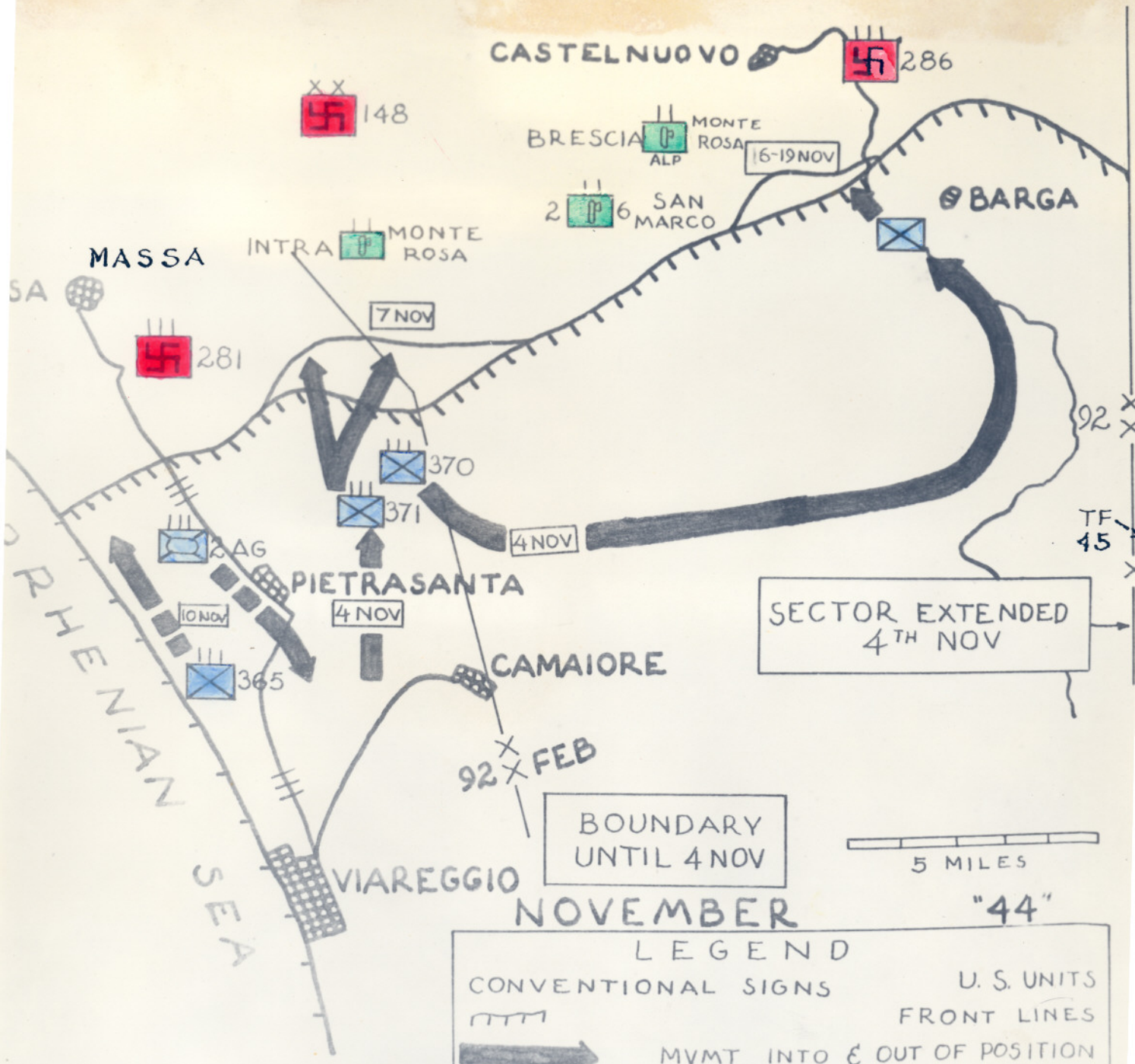
The stage was well set on 5 April, when the 370th and the 442d Infantry Regiments and one (1) Battalion, 473d Infantry as Division reserve attacked the enemy in the LIGURIAN COASTAL SECTOR while the 473d Infantry one (1) battalion made a demonstration in the SERCHIO SECTOR as a prelude to the 15th Army Group offensive in Italy. On 8 April the 473d Infantry left the SERCHIO and changed places with the 370th

On 18 April the enemy withdrew in the SERCHIO and the 370th Infantry Regiment minus the 2d Battalion (in Division reserve on the coast) followed the enemy withdrawal until his resistance collapsed on 29 April. In the meantime, the 442d and 473d Infantry Regiments advanced along the LIGURIAN COAST, initially against heavy and later against moderate enemy resistance, captured, MASSA, SARZANA, LA SPEZIA AND GENOA and sent strong patrols as far as TORINO, CUNEO, AND IMPERIA. The 2d Battalion, 370th Infantry had been returned to its regiment on 23 April near AULLA.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

92D INFANTRY DIVISION - ITALIAN CAMPAIGNS

(24 August 1944 - 2 May 1945)

PRELIMINARY

24 August to 5 October 1944 - CT 370 attached to 1st Armd Div under IV Corps. Participates in activities in connection with seizing and crossing ARNO River; occupation of LUCCA, MONTICATINI and SAN MARCELLO; and penetration of Gothic Line. First enemy contact made 250915A August.

OCTOBER 1944

- 05 - 1800A - Major General E. M. Almond assumes command of TF 92 (2d Armd Grp and 370 Combat Team).
- 05 - 2000A - Field Order No. 1 announces limited objective.
- 06 - 0600A - TF 92 attacks to NW to seize MASSA.
- 12 - 2 AG seizes limited objective in left sector. 370 makes slight gains, then enemy counter attack forces 370 back and attack of 06 is not successful.
- 13 - Patrolling program begins.
- 19 - 1700A - Field Order No. 2 designates concentration areas for Division units on the way.
- 22 - 370 occupies position on S slope of MT STRETTOIA with 1 platoon reinforced.
- 30 - Road through SERAVEZZA is opened for jeeps.

NOVEMBER 1944

- 03 - 371 Inf relieves 370 Inf. 370 Inf moves to SERCHIO sector.
- 04 - Div sector extended to 25 Easting. 370 disbanded as separate administrative organization and comes under Div control; assumes command in SERCHIO 041000A.
- 04 - 2000A - Field Order No 3 announces mission to hold maximum enemy forces in coastal area; exert pressure and protect Fifth Army left flank.
- 08 - 371 occupies AZZANO, BASATI, TERRINCA, LEVIGLIANI.
- 10 - 365 Inf comes under Div control and relieves 2 AG.
- 13 - All elements of 92d Div committed.
- 16-19- 370 attacks to seize CASTELNUOVO. Small advances are made but mission is not accomplished.
- 28 - 366 Inf Regt attached to 92 Div.

DECEMBER 1944

- 04 - 365 detached from 92 Div and attached to 88 Div at SAVAZZO.
- 12 - Infantry weapons shoots begin.
- 17 - 1200A - Field Order No 4 announces attack to seize limited objectives.
- 22 - Enemy offensive intentions in the SERCHIO VALLEY are indicated.
- 23 - 337 RCT (85 Div) and 760 Tank Bn attached to 92 Div.
- 25 - 1600A - Field Order No 5 announces defensive mission.
- 26 - 92 Div assumes defensive roles as mission changes to (maintain line by counterattack).
- 26-28- Enemy attacks in SERCHIO sector with 4 Bns. Attack penetrates positions and forces 2d Bn 366 Inf and 1st Bn 370 Inf to withdraw. 8 Ind Div assumes command in SERCHIO sector at 271300A.
- 27 - Sector narrowed.
- 28 - 135 RCT (34 Inf Div) attached to 92 Div.

JANUARY 1945

- 01 - 92d Div Mule Pack Bn activated.
- 05 - 135 and 337 released.
- 10 - 0900A - Field Order No 6 announces defensive mission. 92 Div reassumes command SERCHIO sector. 365 relieves 8th Ind Div units East of River. Boundary extended to 25 Easting.
- 17 - 1200A - 366 (-3d Bn) assumes command West Bank of SERCHIO. 370 begins rehabilitation program.

FEBRUARY 1945

- 01-05- 365 and 366 advance in SERCHIO sector. 365 occupies line Mt Della Stella, Lama Di Sotto, Albiano, Castelvecchio. 366 occupies Hill 437, Gallicano against light opposition, Mt Faeto, Calomini, Vergemoli. Gallicano-Vergemoli road freed by 366.
- 06 - 1600A - Field Order No 7 announces attack in coastal sector.
- 08 - 365 withdraws from Lama Di Sotto after repulsing 2 enemy counterattacks.

FEBRUARY CONT'D

- 09-11- 3d Bn 366 Inf, 370 and 371 Inf Regiments reinforced by tanks and Arty and supported by IV Corps Artillery and Engineers, attack in the coastal sector W of 97 Easting. Mission not accomplished. Gain of about 800 yards is lost on 14 Feb.
- 10 - 1200A - Field Order No. 8.
- 23 - 1800A - Div sector extended to 44 Easting, including all troops therein, thus 473 Inf Regt comes under Division control.
- 24 - 1800A - Field Order No 9 announces Division will hold the maximum any force in the coastal sector and exert pressure within capabilities. Reorganization of 370th Infantry begins.
- 25 - 473 begins to relieve 366.
- 26 - 0500A - 473 assumes command of 366 sector in SERCHIO.
- 28 - 2400A - 365 relieved from 92 Div, assumes command CUTIGLIANO sector under IV Corps. 473 Inf assumes command of entire SERCHIO VALLEY sector. 366 begins rehabilitation and training program.

MARCH 1945

- 03 - 366 begins 7 day period of extensive training in Division Training Area.
- 06 - 679 TD Bn attached to Division. Remains in Staging Area vic LEGHORN. "E" Co 370 conducts unsuccessful raid.
- 12-13- 473 gains in the SERCHIO.
- 17 - 370, as reorganized, begins intensive training and rehabilitation program.
- 25 - 442 Inf Regt attached to 92 Div effective 1800B.
- 29 - 366 Regt leaves Div control and assembles vic BOTTINOCCHIO. 442, plus attachments, closes in Division concentration area and begins training program.

APRIL 1945 - 2 MAY 45

- 03 - Field Order No 10 orders an attack in the Ligurian Coastal sector. 760 Tank Bn attached 92d Division.
- 05 - 370 and 442 attack at 0500B, while 371 carries on diversionary demonstration South of F. La Foce. Planned patrolling program stops in coastal sector.
- 08 - 370 moves to Serchio sector. 371 leaves Division. 473 advances to outskirts of Massa against strong resistance.

APRIL 1945 - 2 MAY 45 CONT'D

- 10 - 3d Bn 370 moves to Serchio. 442 occupies M. Bruggiano. 1 Bn 473 occupies Massa.
- 11 - 3 Bn 442 enters Carrara without opposition. 473 crosses Frigido and advances 1500 yds.
- 12 - 758 assumes command of sector between 473 and coast.
- 16 - 370 occupies Fiantone.
- 18 - Eny withdraws in Serchio and 370 begins pursuit. Planned patrolling program stops in Serchio.
- 19 - 2 Bn 370 occupies and idgs in on M. Altissimo.
- 20 - 370 enters Castelnuovo di Garfagnana at 0740B without eny resistance.
- 22 - 473 partol enters Sarzana.
- 23 - 442 occupies Tendola and M. Nebbione. TF Curtis crosses Magra River to Punta Bianca and reaches Ameglia. Field Order No 11 - 1700B orders the seizure of Genoa and pursuit of the eny to Cisa and Cerreta.
- 24 - TF Curtis and TF Steinman enter La Spezia. 442 occupies San Stefano. 370 enters Fivizzano. 473 advanced towards Genoa and is fired on near Lavagna by Porto Fino guns. 2 Bn 442 enters Aulla after heavy fighting and is relieved later by 3d Bn 370.
- 27 - 473 enters Genoa.
- 28 - 370 occupies Pontremoli. Enemy garrison on M. Moro surrenders to 473. 473 occupies Genoa, and elements advance to Savona.
- 29 - Enemy resistance collapses. 442 enters Allesandria. Combat patrols enter Torino and Cuneo.
- 30 - Enemy pockets cleaned up. PWs collected and evacuated.

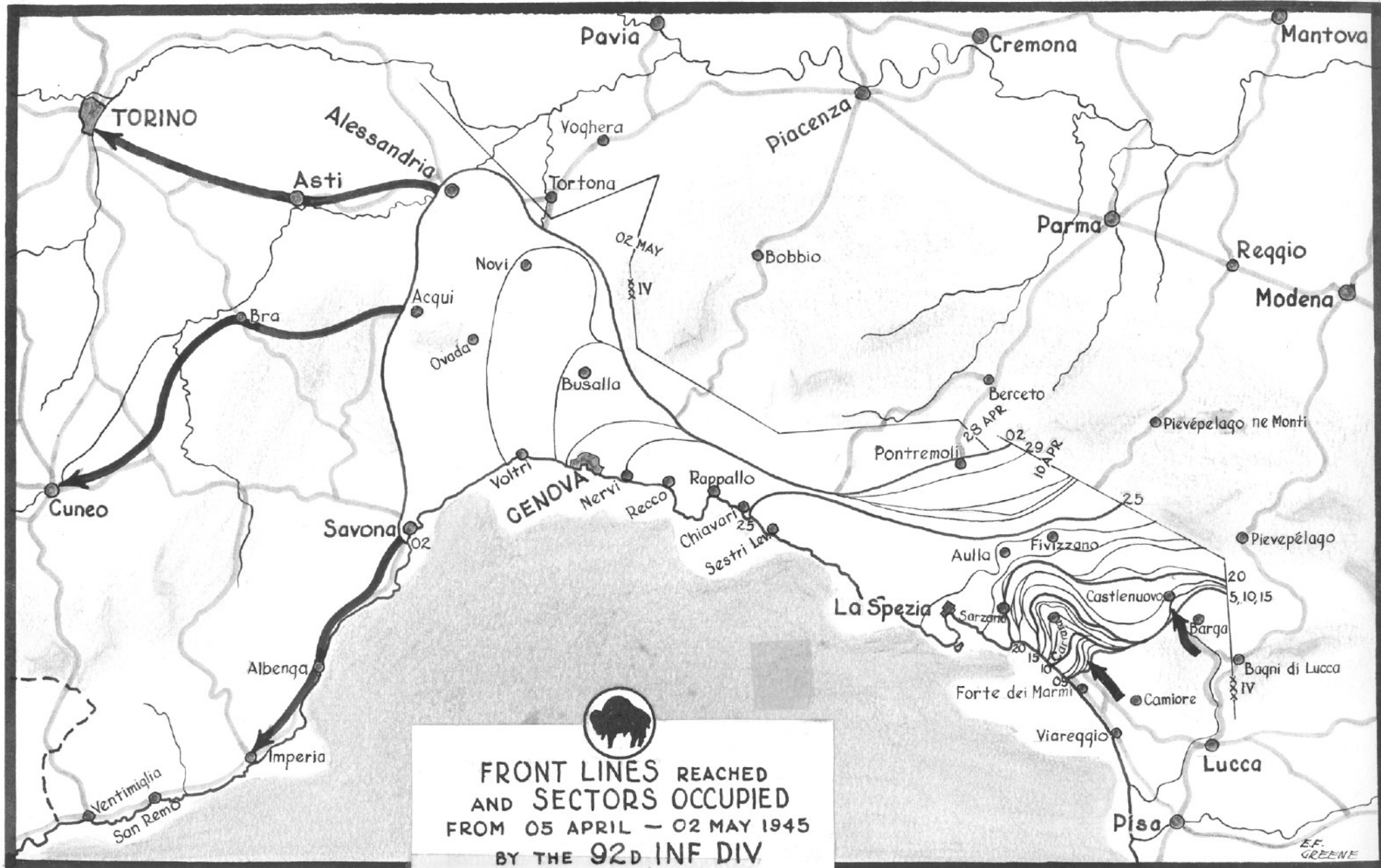

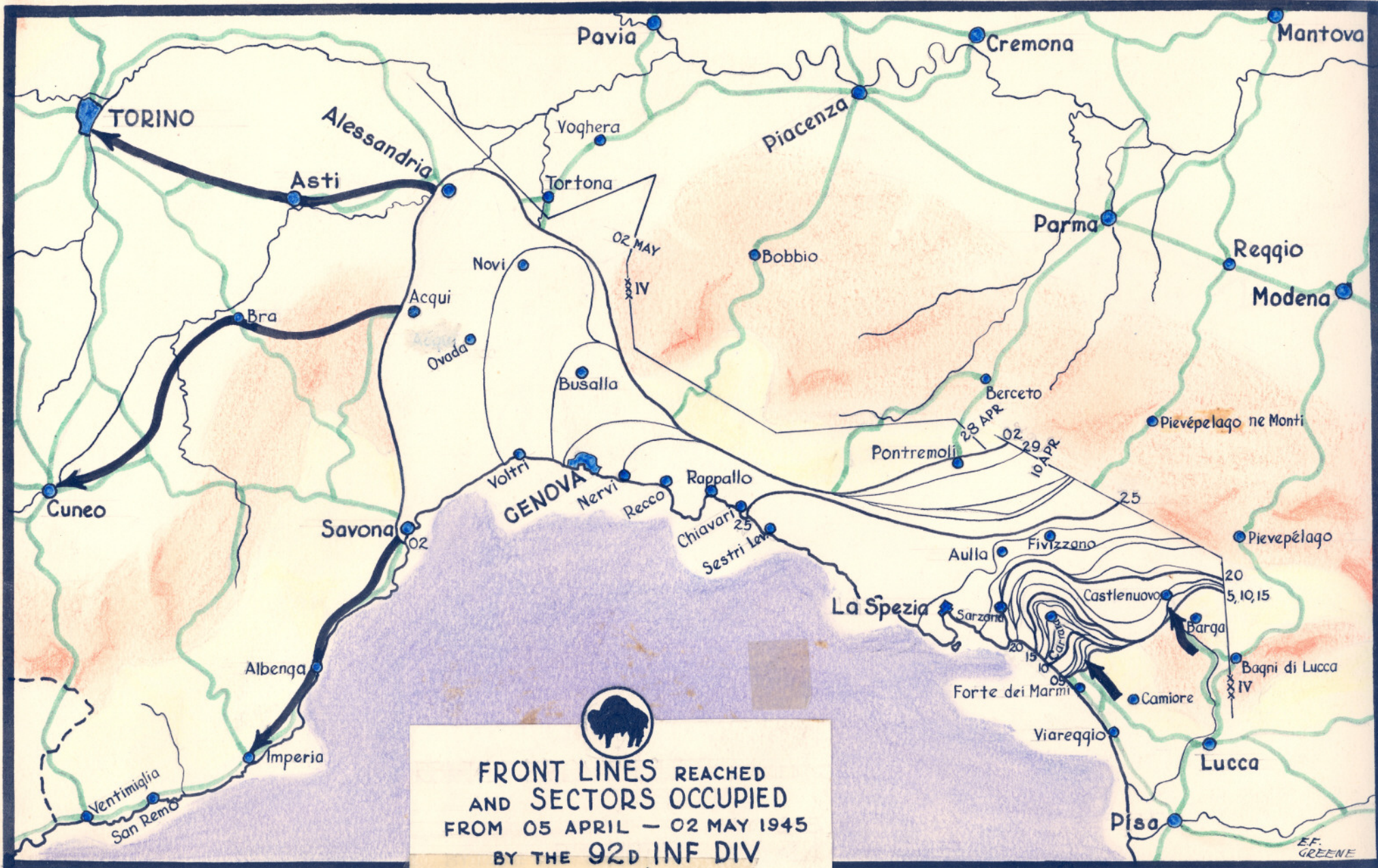
